shower stalls, soap in the bathrooms, diaper changing stations in both the men and woman bathrooms and kiosks that are more directive to help people find their way around Farragut.

When asked about the shoreline logging near Beaver Bay, Liz says that our children will benefit from the work that is done today. "Losing trees and feeling that loss is a very human thing. It's a process of grieving. So, the State Park is committed to stay on top of the Fish and Game regarding the restoration of the trail.

Liz affirms Farragut Park has the space to add a dog park, however, currently there is no funding for that type of potential project. The fencing, benches and dog waste station would need to be fully funded, a plan in place and then the project would be presented to the board for approval.
