I know, getting on the phone with your grandma or super chatty aunt



A rare beauty, she flows through town with little fanfare, though once she quenched our thirst as the life blood of our community.



While some nurture and cherish her beauty, for the most part she is treated as nothing more than a drainage ditch through town. But walking her upper reaches, seeing her in her glory flowing through the last remnants of ancient cedars is to revisit the Garden of Eden.

Bayview Creek is host to Idaho's State Fish, the Cut Throat Trout. Though sadly their journey from Lake Pend Oreille has long since been cut short. But the fish's presence grants her the status of a Class One Stream and protects her and her shoreline from harm.

Her historic value as a source of clear fresh water for our community has been set aside as we tap the seemingly limitless aquifer that flows from Lake Pend Oreille beneath our feet. But one day we may need her again so her protection is vital to Bayview's wellbeing.

In October, I discovered wannabe prospectors with pickaxes and shovels laying waste to her bed. Their fool's errand and trespass has been duly noted and must stop. For gold has never been found along her course.

An effort was made several years ago to remedy the many challenges she faces negotiating her path through town. These include: hazardous & undersized culverts, pesticide, herbicide and fertilizer from lawns and polluted runoff from roadways.

Bayview Creek is a treasure. An unpolished stone and a natural resource easily taken for granted until she overflows her banks in periodic floods.

Oh that we might free her from her dungeon. Let her flow freely and support a spawning population of cut throat once again. Allowing her beauty to grace our downtown with a wild freedom that nurtures our lake and our spirits would be a noble gesture and grace our community.

- Bayview Creek is 6 miles long
- Highest Point: Cape Horn Peak elevation 4,519
- · Outflow elevation: 2,065 when entering the lake
- · Last recorded flood: Winter 1996/Spring 1997
- The creek passes directly through the center of Bayview
- It has a reproducing population of cutthroat trout and brook trout as identified in surveys by the IDEQ and by sampling conducted in the past by Gregg Mauser, a cutthroat trout specialist focused on tributaries to Lake Pend Oreille.
- Drainage Size: 2,000 to 3,000 acres


Pastor's Corner

Why the Pilgrims Hated Christmas

In 1659, the Pilgrims banned the celebration of "Foolstide." In those days, breaking the law of "exchanging gifts, greetings, and similar satanical practices" ran a fine worth \$8,000! But how could the Pilgrims be such scrooges? With their belt buckle hats and prayer-clasped hands, they appear more like happy Whos of Whoville, not a group of grinches with hearts two sizes too small.

The Pilgrims' hate for Christmas came from their love for Christ. The Act of Supremacy under Queen Elizabeth I established a government-run religion that forced people to



follow a watered down form of the faith. It prioritized tradition over truth and decorations over doctrine. In rebellion, the Pilgrims lived a simple life free from rituals and religious ornamentation. This included Christmas, which back then was a government mandated holiday.

Different kinds of government mandates exist today, but the dangers of December remain the same. People confuse celebrating Christmas for celebrating Christ. Lighting candles and singing "Ave Maria" do not grant a relationship with God. Recognizing sin, repenting from sin, and receiving Christ's forgiveness on the Cross is the only way to love God the way the Pilgrims did (Eph 2:8-9).

But unlike the Pilgrims, let us match the degree of our love for Christ with our love for Christmas, and vice versa. Let us be like Ebenezer Scrooge, who began *A Christmas Carol* as a Puritan and ended it as a Christian, one who recognized that true love for God is expressed in true love for others.
