Farragut Blocks Bayview

When I first saw that the East gate entrance to Farragut Park was closed, I was probably like others who thought it was a temporary closure due to Covid, which caused an influx in park visitors.

On a whim, I decided to call the park assistant manager, Erin McKindree and ask her about it. After playing phone tag, Ms. McKindree sent me an email letting me know, "At this point in time the earliest that the East End will open back up will be winter access when the South Road closes for Cross Country ski and Snow Shoe trails."



Reading this, I only had more questions for Ms. McKindree since the East Gate entrance is always closed to motor traffic in the winter.

After several more back and forth attempts the official policy became clear. The East Gate Entrance is slated to be closed permanently. "The park has been planning to transition to a single entrance to the park to better serve park users and manage opportunities and resources," stated Erin McKindree in a letter dated June 18, 2020.

I couldn't help think about all the campers, boaters, disc golf and Tree to Tree Adventure users whom may want to come to Bayview for a meal, drink, or supplies. Now they would have to exit on the South Entrance Road which is almost at Park Headquarters. Would they return in the direction they just came from or go to Athol since they are now close to the park exit? Can this be good for Bayview businesses?

As for those of us who regularly use the park, how inconvenient is this? It's extremely inconvenient. As a frequent park user, I now have to drive an extra ten minutes toward the park Headquarters to go back in the same direction where I just came from and then an extra ten minutes when I leave the park.

Twenty extra minutes total to go to Beaver Bay, Sunrise Picnic area, or the public boat launch. An unnecessary waste of time and gas. It's like closing the front door to your home and making you go around to the back door.

At the June 23 Council Annual Meeting, members voted to initiate an online petition in the hope of convincing the park powers that be, that closing the East gate is not in anyone's best interest. 
