#### What Colleen Brings to the Table

Colleen heard about Bayview through her son-in-law who

knew she and her husband, Roger, were looking for a place to retire. They came here for the first time in June 2015 and fell in love with Bayview. When they returned, "We rounded the curve into Bayview on July 5 around 1 pm and were greeted with an explosion of smoke billowing over



Cape Horn. The sheriff was evacuating the outdoor market and Bayview's residents. We had a reservation at MacDonalds and I sat by our cabin that night and watched the fire burn on the hill. I cried."

After returning home, Colleen found a house on the Cape in the multiple listings, but they couldn't return to Bayview since the Cape Horn Rd was closed for over a week. As soon as the sheriff let some traffic through, the owners met them and they were the first ones to view it. They sat at one of Ralph's outside tables with their realtor and wrote up the offer. "There is no place else I would rather be," says Colleen.

" I've been involved in Bayview Water and Sewer issues and operations for the past 3 years. I am familiar with the Water Facilities Plan as well as the financial and regulatory documentation and requirements. I attended the Water Facility planning meetings. Understanding the system and how critical it is to get it where it needs to be is important to me," says Colleen.

Colleen's background as Chief Operating Officer of a financial institution gave her lots of experience working with legal counsels and certified public accountants. Experience in underwriting and issuing mortgage backed securities enables her to understand government processes.

Colleen served on the board for the Chamber of Commerce's Bayview Daze committee. Being very detail oriented, Colleen made a management plan to organize all the tasks it takes to run Bayview Daze. She had separate divisions of individual action assignments that were to be accomplished which included a specific date it needed to be done by. If that is not bound and determined, I don't know what is.

According to Colleen, "I personally feel a great obligation to make wherever I am a better place and I think right now the most critical issue to Bayview is our water system. It's the biggest opportunity to do something for the Bayview community and hopefully we'll have a positive outcome."
