the winter," said Daveana proudly. She needed a helping hand and a cheery disposition to welcome the patrons while she cooked, so they agreed Kevin would quit his daytime job. He enjoys working with the "boss."

The couple is committed to giving back to the community. Last Thanksgiving, they were preparing Thanksgiving Dinner at the coffee house when many of the local patrons started donating food for the event. They decided to open their doors to everyone and served a free Thanksgiving dinner to the community. "We even delivered dinners to those who could not make the trip to the coffee house," Kevin stated with pride.

Of course, Daveana loves cooking and creating new dishes. "We will always serve some of Ralph's signature dishes such as MacRalph's and Ralph's World Famous French Toast." Daveana has introduced signature dishes such as Lemon Shrimp. "We're very excited that we will soon be offering beer and wine," said Kevin.
