Living History with Mitzi

Mitzi Johnson embodies everything we imagine small town life to be. According to Mitzi "I know for a fact that I couldn't live here if it weren't for Ralph's Cafe and the Mercantile."



"The girls bring my coffee out and I don't even have to get off the golf cart. In the wintertime I call the Mercantile and give

Debbie my order and she delivers my groceries. No matter what I order Debbie will find it. This town is really special and I don't want to go anywhere else."

Mitzi stories are shared by many other locals. Once you've spent time here, Bayview holds your heart, it brings you back. The most fortunate ones find a way to stay. While she's only lived here full time since 1995, between 1968 and then, Bayview was her home away from home every weekend possible. She remembers being able to pull over anywhere you wanted and camp in Farragut State Park and never see a park ranger.

We think Bayview is slow now, perhaps slightly behind the times, but in 1968 JD's only had two booths and the post office was in the back room of the Mercantile. Some may wonder how JD's came to be named. Mitzi remembers JD himself, for whom the bar is named, as a sweet, nice guy. Back then Mitzi liked to dance in JD's and said they had a great jukebox. Some things stay the same: bars are still a hangout for the young as well the young at heart.

She also noted another local meeting spot where fishermen collected. Back then fishing in Lake Pend Oreille seemed like an endless all you can eat buffet. "The fish cleaning station at the boat launch was a popular hang out, and I'll never forget when my friend, who still lives in Bayview, actually fell in under the dock and was greeted by giant swarming sucker fish feeding upon the piles of fish guts."

Fifty years later, we still look in amazement at the old boat lift shed behind the Captain's Wheel. Mitzi recalls a betting pool on when it would fall. Obviously no one collected on that bet. Some things haven't changed since 1968 although it appears that the current owner hopes to rehabilitate the structure. Only time will tell and Mitzi is amazed it's still standing.

Compared to 1968 Bayview appears to have had a facelift. "The town is cleaned up, and looks a lot better" says Mitzi.

In 1995 Mitzi and her husband bought property in Bayview, a two room Farragut cabin which later (con't)

they tore down and built a house.

These days Mitzi can be found cruising the streets of Bayview in her golf cart, occasionally stopping to enjoy a cup of coffee at Ralph's. Give her a "Hi Ho" for the last fifty years she's seen us come and go.

Calling All Cell Phones

There I met Ryan Beardslee, store manager with AT&T who informed me that his company was eager to be the first to put a cell tower in Bayview. Most surprising was how close they are to accomplishing this goal.

A few days later Ryan emailed, "We just had a tower north of the Bayview area go on air today. I do not think this will hit Bayview, but I will be conducting tests with the network team to see if we can redirect the Granite Tower to reach Bayview since it does not need to push north anymore. I have no idea if it will reach, but I will keep you updated."

Wow! The Granite Tower can be seen from Hwy 95 just north of Athol above the Kelso Lake turnoff. Looks like a straight shot into town down Perimeter Road.

Ryan went on to add, "I have driven a lot of attention to the tower in Bayview, all the way to the director's office! So everyone is talking about it."
