It all started with a popcorn popper. "The fluid bed can actually be used to roast coffee. You can throw the beans in popcorn popper and actually roast coffee," said **Careywood Coffee** proprietor Jeromy Scheel.



Jeromy's infatuation with coffee began when he worked as a bistro while attending North Idaho College. Jeromy, a Spokane native, married North Idaho native Stacy Stuart in 1996. After Jeromy graduated with a Bachelors of Business Administration – Management in 1998, the couple decided to settle in Athol. Over the next several years, Jeromy worked at Diedrich Manufacturing in Ponderay, a company that builds custom Americanmade coffee roasters. "While there I became interested in the global perspective on roasting the beans, the soil types and learning about the different areas of the world. All the fun stuff that goes into coffee," he said with a smile.

For a few years, the family roasted coffee and distributed their product to clients from their home. In October of 2017, Jeromy and Stacy took a leap of faith and opened the Athol store. Stacy and a few other family members designed the company logo as a complement to her hometown. "Careywood ties into where we live; where my wife grew up. The "wood" and "care" theme ties in with the tag line "Loving the World One Bean at a Time" explained Jeromy. The interior design of the store was also a family collaboration which has a warm and welcoming atmosphere meant to make your experience special and unique.

Local artist's works and crafter's products are displayed on consignment and rotated weekly which ensures maintaining a fresh décor. Jeromy receives organic green beans from the Organic Products Trading Company, Royal Coffee, Atlas Coffee and several others. The green beans are then roasted, packaged and shipped to various clients directly from the Careywood store. As far as future plans, Jeromy is interested in growing the business through direct trade with farms all over the globe. In addition, he hopes to give back to different mission organizations in the various countries he visits.

On the home front, Jeromy and Stacy have been very busy raising two biological daughters, Ayla and Kali, but their family doesn't end there. These two wonderful, generous people were on a mission to help children in need. Over the last 13 years they have adopted four children with different special needs: two from the Idaho Foster Care system and two from the Ukraine. Their names are Olya, Gavin, Eli and Ivan.

At this time, the family shares in operating the store and is involved in community events such as the Athol Farmers Market. Ayla enjoys holding down the fort part-time for her parents. Bitter End Divers

DOCKSIDE DIVERS MAKES THE CASE FOR A CLEAN HULL

More power to ambitious young people who catch the entrepreneurial bug and provide important services to our community.

Two local Bayview young men, Jack Duclos and Max Hohle, operate a boat cleaning business called **Bitter End Diving.** Both are certified divers, earning their certification in 2013.

Jack and Max became friends while attending Athol Elementary and when they started playing on the same Little League baseball team, their friendship grew.

Typically, Bitter End Diving cleans sailboat bottoms but they have had requests to scrub the bottom of fiberglass or wooden hauls. Boats on shore can be coated with an Ablative paint. Ablative paint is designed to wash away or fall away while the boat is under way, but very slowly. This helps prevent build up of algae or blisters on the fiberglass.

Bitter End Divers can scrub away excess algae if the boat has been sitting still, usually after winter. When algae builds up on a hull it creates a lot of drag, and sailboats, in particular, sail noticeably different when they have a clean hull. They also can scrub outdrives or planer tabs to make sure they are functioning properly. If requested and if parts are supplied they will install zinc anodes to help fight corrosion.

"No chemicals are used underwater," says Max. "We don't want to poison the local environment, so all we use are brushes or sponges."

Bitter end Diving charges \$3 per foot for the cleaning/ survey. All services are included in that price.

They also offer recovery dives. Have you ever dropped something in the lake and wanted it back? Jack and Max will attempt to recover the item. If they're doing a boat scrub then recovery will not cost extra. If it's purely a recovery dive it can be negotiated but there is a \$50 minimum if scuba is required.

"This year they are upgrading to a Hookah system. Hookah is an on the dock/surface compressor where a diver need only take a hose down with him to breathe" states Max. They're hoping this will cut costs and accelerate cleaning operations, with no longer needing to have scuba tanks refilled as often. Max adds "In the future hookah will allow us to have underwater air tools, although those will be more for working on docks or float homes rather than boats."
