Ron's extended family has had a long association with Lake Pend Oreille dating back to the 1920's and 30's. His own family came to Bayview in 1936. They lived with relatives until their father completed the first of two log cabins above Cape Horn Road – both of which remain today. During WWII Ron and his brother Larry walked the 2 1/2 miles to school in Bayview while their father worked at various construction jobs at Farragut Naval Training Center.

The sudden death of Ron's father in 1943 prompted the family to move to Washington. Ron graduated from Gonzaga with a degree in civil engineering. He and his bride Robin raised six children but never forgot their ties to Bayview, retiring to a newly constructed home on Cape Horn Road in 1997. Since that time both became avid participants in numerous community affairs.

Robin, a talented artist, was active in the BAB Women's Club, the local garden club, and served on the Community Center Foundation. Ron devoted much time to the Chamber of Commerce and was a board member of Kootenai Electric for 13 years. Best wishes go out to them and many thanks for their contributions to Bayview.


