Community Christmas Parade



Vacation Rental Regulations

The boom in vacation rentals, evidenced in Bayview, has caught the eye of Kootenai County officials. Hearings will soon be held to decide what if any regulations and fees need to be developed.

If you are a homeowner with a short term rental property, or a neighbor who does not appreciate the issues short term rental property can bring, Kootenai County wants to hear from you.

Is there a difference between someone who rents a room in their home and an agency run rental income property? And are either one different from a motel? What health and safety issues need to be addressed? How about fees and taxes? What impacts do short term rentals have on community values and cohesiveness?

Long term renters often become part of a community. Vacation renters sometimes party to hardy. Short term rentals provide valuable supplemental sources of income. Available rooms, cabins and even camping spaces are often booked solid in the summer. In this case, having extra rooms to rent provides a valuable service for our tourist based economy.

Issues are never black and white. The best solutions arise from citizens participating in the process of governing. This is still in the proposal phase. There is not even a draft yet of the ordinance. For more information call Planning and Zoning @ (208) 446-1070
