Lakeland Schools

The Lakeland Joint School District is honored to serve the students in our communities. We were proud to be identified as the number one school district in Idaho in 2015 by NICHE.

On March 8th we are running a supplemental levy election. The current levy will expire this year. When the recession hit budgets were drastically cut and patrons provided support through supplemental levy dollars..

On Tuesday, March 8th, voters will have an opportunity to vote in a \$5.3 million supplemental one year levy. It is our goal to lessen the reliance on levy dollars to run our programs.

Had we chosen to levy at the current rate, this supplemental levy would have generated \$5 million. With the slight increase to the rate we will generate an additional \$300,000 which we will use to enhance the security systems and measures within our schools. Security enhancements are not funded by the state.

Times have changed and now we need to ensure that we are allowing the right people access to our schools and ultimately our students. The median cost of a home in Rathdrum is \$150,000. Based on this value and the homeowner's exemption on this home, the increased cost of this levy will be \$1.03 per month or \$12.33 per year.

Registered voters must cast their ballots in their identified precincts. Polls will be open from 8 a.m. to 8 p.m. If you have any questions about the levy election you can contact a district administrator at 208-687-0431.
