CAPE HORN FIRE REFUGEES One Year Later

On a quiet Sunday morning, July 5, 2015, Dave and Teri Tomberg noticed an alarming smell drifting over Cape Horn Mountain. Smoke. Dave recalled "We went to look, came back, soaked the roof of the house and the hedges. Then we grabbed our computers, some important papers, and left for Spokane. When we came back, Cape Horn Road was closed." They found Gary McDonald who gave them the chilling news: "Your house is gone. We watched it burn."

The Cape Horn Fire eventually burned over 1,300 acres destroying nine homes and taking 12 days to contain.

"We were really lucky we left when we did" said Dave. "The fire burned along the lake then up the stairway to the home. With the power out there was no electricity, no way to pump water from the lake. All means of escape may have been blocked."

Originally from Cleveland, Ohio, Dave and Teri are retired teachers. He taught high school physics, she taught music. They began building the house themselves in 1973. "We put in seven summers of effort to finish it," said Teri. Dave added that the house "was designed primarily by me, and we just figured things out as we went along." They lived in tents each summer while working on their hillside home.

The artfully constructed house was carefully crafted onto a narrow ledge just east of the Cape Horn landslide. It was surrounded by flower and vegetable beds. Terri built impressive stone retaining walls.

I really don't miss all that work" said Dave. They also don't miss the 35 steps down to the house from the road or the 75 steps down to the lake.

After the fire, the Tombergs stayed with friends for a week until their homeowner's insurance put them in temporary home, a float house in McDonald's Hudson Bay Resort. They have adjusted comfortably to their new surroundings. "People are only out here one or two days a week" said Teri. "This is a more carefree lifestyle."

The Tombergs plan on rebuilding but Dave said the new house "will not be the same design, and we'll use less flammable materials." Right now, creating an acceptable drain field for the septic system is the only problem to figure out before work begins.

Meanwhile, they continue to be active in local affairs. Dave is still president of the Scenic Bay Tracts
Homeowner's Association and they had spent the morning meeting with that group. "I tried to get out of that job by telling them 'It's not the landowner's



association but the homeowner's association' but they just told me, 'We'll change the name if we have to.'"

One year after the fire, Dave and Teri are using the time to consider options for their new summer home. They are comfortable now but Dave acknowledges that they "miss the pride one gets from living in a house we built ourselves." He quickly adds "We also miss the great view."

Cape Horn Fire Report

The Idaho Department of Lands will release the Cape Horn Fire Report today, Friday, July 15. The Community Council Website will have excerpts online by noon today and a link where you can download the complete findings.


