

#### Idaho Archaeology Month In Bayview by Laurie Mauser

Every May is Idaho Archaeology and Historic Preservation Month in Idaho. This year's theme is "Celebrating the 50th Anniversary of the National Historic Preservation Act." The Act established State Historic Preservation Office which manage NHPA programs, review federal projects which give locals a voice in projects like highway projects, timber sales, protection of federal lands, powerlines, and the Certified Local Government (CLG) program which provides incentives for communities to preserve their historic properties. And, the Act established the National Register of Historic Places.

Bayview will be participating in this year's Idaho Archaeology and Historic Preservation month. On May 7th. The Kootenai County Historic Preservation Commission (a CLG) and the Bayview Community Council are sponsoring a



presentation and field trip on the Pend'Oreille City archaeological investigations, a project funded through a CLG grant.

Investigations are being led by historical archaeologist Dr. Stacey Camp, University of Idaho Assistant Professor of Anthropology and

Director of the Alfred E. Bowers Anthropology Laboratory at the U of I. Dr. Camp holds a PhD from Stanford University and specializes in late 1800-early 1900 settlements. She will be presenting the results of the first phase of investigations at Pend 'Oreille City 10am at the Community Center, followed by a field trip of the site.

#### **New Barriers Needed on Cape Horn Road** by Jan Jones

The logging of fire-damaged trees along Cape Horn road due to last summer's fire has created a new dilemma for Cape Horn residents. The jersey barriers currently in place end just as you crest the summit and start down. Now because of the lack of trees on the south side of Cape Horn, the road appears extremely narrow and treacherous. Many residents who regularly drive the road are very concerned especially about driving in icy and foggy weather.

Paul Stanton and Chuck Murray are leading the efforts to ask Kootenai County Commissioners to continue some kind of barrier further down the road. They presented their request at the February commissioners' meeting. All three commissioners agreed to look into it and will report back.

Paul and Chuck have requested support from the Bayview Community Council and the Council unanimously agreed to write a letter to the commissioners. The Cape Horn Estates Homeowners Association has also written a letter of support.

## I'll Be Watching You

Benjamin Franklin famously said, "Those who trade liberty for security deserve neither." There's no doubt that modern surveillance cameras provide private citizens and businesses a sense of security. But at what point do they violate your privacy rights?

The latest generation of security cameras allow for: high definition, 360 degree rotation, night vision, and over 100x magnification. They use A.I. programs to: track movements, identify faces and license plates and keep watch for them, then alert the operator to view the scene from a smart phone anywhere in the world. An unethical operator could easily spy on someone from a great distance.

There's no disputing that we have the right to point cameras at our own property. While most criminals are too drunk or stupid to be deterred by video cameras they do provide excellent evidence at trial. Some states require operators to block out other people's properties if requested.

Heads up and you'll see cameras on poles at Mario's Restaurant, at the Lime Kiln, on the little brick building on Main Street, and many boat docks. Expect one more across from the post office on Emerson Road, the road leading to BW&S.

There's been a lively discussion going on at Facebook where one Bayview resident expressed concerns that unsuspecting visitors aren't aware of cameras in town. How do you feel about security cameras pointed at you or your property? Do they make you feel more secure or feel they're an invasion of your privacy?
