

Pen d'Oreille City Investigations Update

The Kootenai County Historic Preservation
Commission has received a Certified Local
Government grant from the National Park Service to
complete the second phase of archaeological
investigations at Pen d'Oreille City in Farragut. In
association with the University of Idaho, recording and
mapping of the site will be completed. Ground
penetrating radar will identify below surface features. A
U of I graduate student has also obtained grant funding
for research for her master's thesis under the direction
of Dr. Robert Sappington, principal investigator for
Phase 2. Work begins in June with opportunity for
public involvement in the fieldwork. The site will then
be nominated for inclusion onto the National Register
of Historic Places. (This is the historic spelling of Pend' Oreille)

wildlife with a camera
provides benefits to both
the photographer and our
wild animal neighbors.



"Do Not Disturb!" Just like a hunter with a gun, if you

spook the animal, you miss the shot. It is hard enough for wildlife to survive without paparazzi seeking a closeup. Always respect wildlife while hunting for that perfect shot. Use your zoom and tripod.

Remember cameras can kill. Being scared away from food or water, even being overly stressed, can be deadly for wildlife. As is being fed for a picture, then acting unafraid of the next human who may have a gun.

Look around and you will be amazed how much life awaits your focus. Even insects make for great subjects. Not to mention: pets, livestock, birds and your fellow humans.

Patience brings rewards, as does fast, practiced reflexes. There are many tricks used in wildlife photography. Some that are just wrong and even cruel.

Animals are afraid of humans and flee our attention for good reason. They are intelligent and curiously aware of our presence. Try to act casually and respectfully. Naturalists say, "Humans are the only species lacking consciousness."

Do a google search for "best way to photograph wildlife." Read the great advice that is available. Treat animals as you want to be treated yourself and the natural world will reward you with many wild photographic memories.

Wildlife photography is a healthy hobby. You'll begin to see the world through new eyes. The trails of Farragut Park await you. Don't forget to turn on your burst mode.
