Hundreds of Douglas Fir Along Shoreline Marked to Cut

Say goodbye to the last stretch of wild forest along the Shoreline Trail in Farragut State Park. This once cool summer walk along moss covered trails canopied by flowering waves of ocean spray, syringa and wild roses beneath a majestic forest of 100 year old trees will be cut this winter, then burned.

Giant Douglas fir, Grand fir and Ponderosa Pine share this forest, the last children of the great forests that once surrounded Lake Pend Oreille. But somehow in their infinite wisdom the state of Idaho has decided that only Ponderosa Pine shall stand along the shoreline.

Unfortunately, and ironically, local pine beetles have something else in mind. While the state is busily mowing down perfectly healthy stands of fir, the pine are dying en masse. This conundrum seems to have no effect on our trusty officials who are bound and determined to *slash and burn the entire park* for its own good.

You may say, "They must know what they are doing," but in fact they are ignoring every: rule, regulation, guideline, standard, law and common sense itself to get the cut out. By law the parks in Idaho must be managed through a master planning process that respects cultural, historic, recreational, scientific, and wildlife while promoting quality "Park Values." The state has systematically ignored the requirements of the planning process and are logging the entire park while turning the rest of it into a big KOA.

Their true motivation can be found in a letter to the Parks Dept. from Boise that clearly states, "You agreed to log Farragut to help pay for your new headquarters in Coeur d Alene." So now under the guise of "Resource Management" our wonderful park, a green jewel among increasing development must fall to the axe.

Fish & Game Plans

Fish & Game has plans for building a 700 sq. ft. building with showers, toilets, and two bedrooms centrally located to ten camping pads. The site will be one acre or less on property F&G owns near Bayview. The exact location has yet to be determined. After they get the final projects approval from General Services Administration (GSA), F&G plans to hold a town meeting to get the public's input.

F&G representatives met with BWSD board members on October 23 at a Special Meeting. F&G Regional Wildlife Habitat Biologist, Dave Leptich offered suggestions on how Bayview Water & Sewer might pay for using their easement to run the water lines down their property. Robyn Edwards, BWSD board member, said, "It would be premature to make exchanges of value". Leptich asked if there is a way to grant a waiver on a sewer hook up (there's currently a moratorium on ER's).
