

have to travel to the forest and camp out to see the stars. Well, that simple pleasure is heading towards extinction. Why? Light Pollution.

As trees are removed for new construction, light pollution becomes more real. Yard Lights, Shop Lights, and decorative lights being left on all night impact the ability to stargaze and in some cases, sleep.
