Tammy's journey to Bayview was a fascinating one, marked by her roots on a dairy farm in Northern Michigan. In 2005, she and her family made a move to Spokane Valley where they resided for a decade. Next came their move to Post Falls in 2015.

However, the allure of small-town living called to Tammy's soul, leading her to move to a quieter more rural lifestyle. It was then that Bayview beckoned once more. As Tammy and her husband explored potential homes, an unique opportunity arose. Joy Shantz, a friend of theirs, suggested they purchase one of her properties and the decision was clear, Bayview would be their forever home.

What Triggered the Bernard Peak Rockslide?

Back in October I visited with Karen Nuel, a dear friend whose family history goes way back in our lakeside haven. Her stories of the area are treasured gems from a long ago era.

As we sat reminiscing, Karen recounted one particular tale that caught my attention.

“When the Alaskan earthquake happened in 1964 it had more ramifications than just in

Alaska. Back then Bayview

resident, Harold Stewart, had a little cabin out on Cape Horn road on the beach. He heard something like a snowplow and looked out his window toward Bernard Mountain where he was met with an astonishing sight, a colossal wall of water hurtling towards him. Harold scrambled to higher ground, his boats damaged and a series of boat houses lay ravaged in the wave's wake. There weren't many buildings back then, but it caused severe damage to any in the area,” Karen recounted.

On Friday, March 27, 1964, at 5:36 p.m. in Alaska an earthquake of colossal magnitude occurred. According to a Google search, “Water level recorders in 47 states registered the earth's tremors. It was so large that it caused the entire Earth to ring like a bell: vibrations that were among the first of their kind ever recorded by modern instruments.”

Karen's story, intertwined with the 1964 Alaskan earthquake, leads me to ponder whether this colossal seismic event could be the cause behind the monumental rockslide on Bernard Mountain.



So, the question remains: Did the 1964 Great Alaska Earthquake give birth to the massive rockslide on Bernard Mountain?

I contacted Linda Hackbarth, local Bayview historian, and she was unaware of any connection. I also reached out the North Idaho Museum and they were unable to shed light on this.

If you hold a piece of this puzzle or can shed more light on this intriguing tale, your insights are wholeheartedly welcomed. It's an enigma that's ripe for discovery and a piece of Bayview's history waiting to be unveiled.

Pastor's Corner: Who Is King?

Whether it be Ebenezer Scrooge or the Grinch north of Whoville, all the holiday bad guys have King Herod as their prototype. If you don't know the story, Herod was the ruler over Israel at the time Jesus was born in Bethlehem. Upon hearing of Jesus' birth, Herod immediately moved to have Jesus killed.

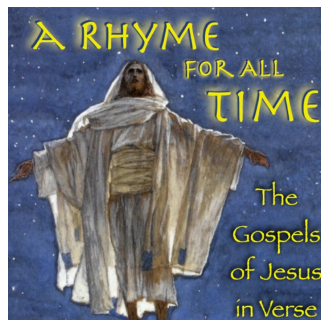
You can read the entire account in the first two chapters of Matthew's Gospel in the Bible. We would be right to ask the question, “Why?” Why such hatred toward a harmless child?

Matthew Chapter 2 says this: Now after Jesus was born in Bethlehem of Judea in the days of Herod the king, behold, wise men from the east came to Jerusalem, saying, “Where is he who has been born king of the Jews? For we saw his star when it rose and have come to worship him.” When Herod the king heard this, he was troubled...

When you read the text, you'll notice that two kings are mentioned. Herod is called “king,” but so is the newborn child. He is “King of the Jews,” and his arrival is so significant that dignitaries from the east found it fitting and right to come and worship him. We draw the same conclusion that Herod drew: if Jesus is king, that means Herod is not king (hence the violent reaction). Herod's throne was threatened.

Jesus still challenges thrones today. Whatever you believe about Jesus, Christmas confronts you with the same question: who is king? Something has the highest authority over each one of us. This Christmas, consider what, or rather, who is truly worthy of the throne over your own heart and life.
